WEDNESDAY LUNCHEON Scrambled Eggs and Rice Green Salad Pumpkin Doughnuts Milk Tea

Pumpkin Doughnuts 4 1/2 cups flour 1/2 teaspoon baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup sugar 1 teaspoon nutmeg 2 tablespoons melted shortening 1 egg, slightly beaten 1 1/2 cups milk 1/2 teaspoon vanilla 1/2 cup cooked pumpkin Mix and sift dry ingredients. Combine rest of ingredients and add to flour mixture, stirring only until blended. Turn dough onto floured board. Roll or pat to 1/2 inch in thickness. Cut with floured doughnut cutter. Fry in deep fat (370 degree F) until brown, turning occasionally. Drain on unglazed paper. Makes two dozen.

Lemon Sauce for Broccoli 3 slices bread 1 cup milk Salt and pepper 1 tablespoon butter 2 tablespoons lemon juice Remove crusts, then crumble bread. Scald milk, add bread, cook slowly, stirring until mixture thickens. Add salt, pepper, butter; beat until smooth. Add lemon juice.
