

Miss Jean Describes Needs of Children in Tarrytown Schools

Mrs. Franklin Montross Again Heads Local Needlework Guild

With 200 home visits and eight months of class room observation, Miss Emelle Jean, nurse in the Tarrytown schools, is eminently qualified to describe lacks of needy local children, as she did yesterday before the Needlework Guild members at the Second Reformed Church lecture room.

Speaking informally, Miss Jean expressed her appreciation of the garments presented to her each year by the local Guild branch. "You ask me what kind of clothing I need," she said. "The answer to that is—just what you have been sending. I always find the clothing exactly appropriate. Warm underwear and stockings are particularly useful, following the need for shoes in importance."

Boys' clothing is particularly needed, since few second-hand boys' articles are received, and the wear is more strenuous than for girls' clothing. Miss Jean learns about the background of her charges from her own school observations, those of the classroom teachers, and from her visits to the homes. She estimated that children from at least 20 relief families would be attending school this winter. Of these families, 17 would be normal groups, one with no mother, and two with no fathers. All would have from three to seven children. Consultation with public welfare workers in the community, according to Miss Jean, seemed to result in concurrence that relief conditions in the Tarrytowns remain about the same as during the past five years.

The annual election of officers resulted in the unanimous vote for the present staff, which will serve in the same capacities for the next four years: Mrs. Franklin Montross, president; Mrs. Alexander Blanton, first vice president; Mrs. W. P. E. Ainsworth, second vice president; Mrs. John Delaney, third vice president; Mrs. John P. Herren, fourth vice president; Mrs. Benjamin Warren, secretary; Mrs. Harry C. Bates, assistant secretary; Mrs. William H. Frame, treasurer.

The slate was presented by Mrs. John Squiers, nominations chairman. Mrs. Francis LaBau is honorary president, and has for 32 years been associated with the Tarrytown branch. Mrs. George Newton was the first president and founder of the branch over forty years ago.

Mrs. C. Fred Odell was president for five years preceding the office of Mrs. LaBau, and although a resident of Mafine for a number of years, has always maintained her connection and interest in the Tarrytown Guild.

The Rev. A. Paul Wright gave the opening prayer, and reports for the year were read by the officers and chairmen. The branch now has 54 directors, one more than last year. Mrs. Montross praised the work of the members and the directors and urged constant progress in spite of the high standard of achievement to date. She spoke especially of the need for a permanent shoe fund, to purchase shoes and rubbers for needy local children.

Two piano pupils of Mrs. Beverly Rodman presented musical selections during the program. Miss Patricia Loughman played "Clare de Lune" by Debussy, and Miss Betty Brown, "Gypsy Dance" by Denzimbry.

Tea, coffee and cake were served at the close of the afternoon, with Mrs. A. Paul Wright and Mrs. William H. Frame presiding at the tea table.

The garments shown (1650 pieces have been received to date), are attractive as well as warm and useful. The children's clothes are colorful and practical, while the layette clothing included all necessities in the most attractive colors and materials. Warm stockings, sweaters, underwear, nightgowns, blankets, bed linen and many other articles were shown to be distributed among the various local agencies.
