Volunteer Registrars Make Ration Enrolment Possible in This Area

Mayor William A. Murphy of Irvington, chairman of the Greenburgh Rationing Board, today praised the school teachers and residents of the local communities who served as registrars for sugar rationing last week, and who also are aiding gasoline enrolment this week.

The Mayor, speaking of the rationing board's work, said recently that without the volunteer help the board would be completely snowed under.

"As it is, with no funds available for expenses or hiring of a staff, all the record work of the rationing board which covers all the incorporated villages of Greenburgh and North Tarrytown as well, is handled by one lone, volunteer clerk."

Irvington donates the office space and the Village Clerk William Pateman, also a member of the board, and his staff help out in the rush periods. However, the Mayor sees lots of work ahead if rationing extends beyond the sugar and gasoline as has been indicated.
