BAD R R CROSSING TO BE CHANGED

Public Service Commission Directs Removal of Highway Over Track at Fishkill

PLACED 43 FT. WESTWARD

Although Watchman Has Been on Duty There by Day, Place Always Is Dangerous

Peekskill motorists will be interested to know that on Friday the Public Service Commission, granted a petition of the State Department of Public Works, Division of Highways, issued an order under Section 43 of the Road Law State highway in the Village of Fishkill, Dutchess County, over the Central New England Railroad, to be moved to the west about 34 feet changing the roadway so that it will cross the tracks at an angle of 30 degrees, requiring the planking of the new crossing to its full width and closing the old highway to traffic.

This is the main highway between Albany and New York on the east side of the Hudson River. Entering Fishkill from the north, it occupies a narrow street which terminates at an east and west street requiring a right angle turn, then turns gradually to the south and approaches the crossing at an angle of 55 degrees. The single track railroad emerges from a rock-cut east of the crossing, the views of the crossing from the north being completely obscured. Watchmen are maintained here from 8:30 A. M. to 5:30 P. M. About 500 feet south of the crossing, the road crosses Fishkill Creek on a bridge about 100 feet long. To improve the entrance to the bridge, which is abrupt, and to avoid the sharp turn in the roadway, the Department of Public Works proposes a realignment from the north end of the bridge to the north of the village. Traffic on the railroad—about five train movements a day—does not now require a suspension of bridge, and the change in location will improve the so that that feature will be improved. Proximity to Fishkill Creek would require the highway to be carried over the railroad if separation of grade is considered. This would require expensive construction and a change in the type of bridge since the grades on the southern approach would have to be carried over the bridge and over the creek.

The Department of Public Works will perform the work required in this order.

Yesterday's Rains Will Start Croton Overflow

Steady Downpour Over Tributaries to Chain of Big Reservoirs Will Cause Cascade

A steady, heavy downpour of rain for hours in the Croton River Valley yesterday swelled all the tributaries to the big chain of reservoirs owned by New York City, and the water level again started rising, so that another overflow is expected at the spillway of Cornell Dam in Croton by nightfall tonight.

The cataract going over the spillway, 1,250 feet wide, for several days did not cease entirely until early Saturday morning. As soon as the reservoirs, within two inches of being full when the latest rainfall started, reap the full benefit of the storm another cataract is likely to go tumbling with a prodigious splash into the gorge 150 feet below the crest of the dam. When the rain stopped during the afternoon yesterday the level of the water in the reservoirs had already climbed about an inch in ten hours.

For the first time since the dam was completed twenty-one years ago it is likely there will be an overflow there when summer officially starts on Tuesday of this week.

\$7,500 PRISON POST TO BE FILLED

The salary will be \$7,500 per year and will be under civil service. The post was last held by Robert T. Kent, who went out of office when the State departments were reorganized.

AGED MAN DIES ON ROADSIDE HERE

George Thompsett, 67, Victim of Acute Indigestion While Walking at Montrose

DOCTOR FINDS HIM DEAD

Had Asked for and Been Given Glass of Water, Death Following Soon Afterward

George Thompsett, 67 years, of Croton, died suddenly at Montrose, N. Y., Saturday afternoon following an attack of acute indigestion. Thompsett was walking along the Albany Post Road from Croton to Peekskill when he became ill. He was found by the arrival of a physician.

The man, who was later learned to have been employed as a flagman at the railroad crossing at High Bridge, had resided in Croton-on-Hudson. Saturday afternoon he was seen walking along the Albany Post Road. When near the Montrose Garage he lay down in the grass on the side of the road. He complained of feeling ill and asked for a drink. He was given a glass of water, after which he vomited.

The persons who gave him the drink left him, but went back in a few minutes and found him in a serious condition. A telephone call was sent to Dr. Vincent Haight, of Montrose, who responded in a few minutes. Thompsett was found to be dead when the physician arrived.

Dr. Perley H. Mason, of South Street, Town Health Officer, who was notified, instructed Curry & Frech, 947 Main Street, to remove the body.

Town Peace Officer Hauck was put on the case and made an investigation. He got in touch with a sister of the deceased man, who resides in Nyack, N. Y. She came to Peekskill yesterday and identified the body.

Dr. Mason signed the death certificate, giving the cause of death as acute indigestion.

Undertaker Bennett of Tarrytown, came to Peekskill this morning and got the remains. Funeral services will be held tomorrow at Sleepy Hollow Cemetery, Tarrytown.

Car Hits Local Man on Highland Avenue

There was an automobile accident about 11:45 o'clock this morning on Highland Avenue, near Reynolds Street. Ben Pollock, of 1647 St. John's Place, Brooklyn, N. Y., owner and driver of an Overland coach, was going north on Highland Avenue. He claimed that Neil Ingersoll, employed by Allen Wightman, was crossing the street behind another automobile.

It is said that Ingersoll became confused on seeing Pollock's car and that in attempting to go back, he was struck and knocked down. The car, it is alleged, passed over one foot. Ingersoll was taken to the office of Dr. Stanton Curry, Nelson Avenue, where he was attended by Dr. Curry and Dr. Martens.

In the car with Pollock were Adolf Weis, a patrolman from Brooklyn, and two other young men.

FIRST FATALITY AT STATE CAMP

Bernard Stein, 19, of Astoria, L. I., Accidentally Drowned in Swimming Pool

DETAILS NOT GIVEN OUT

Young Guardsman Had Been in Training Here Since June 12th—Body Taken Home

The first fatality of the season at Camp Smith occurred Saturday afternoon, about 2:30 o'clock, when Bernard Stein, 19 years old, who had been in training here with his regiment, was drowned. Details concerning the accident were not made available at this time, as the swimming pool and news supply being completely closed today.

Stein, who was the son of Philip Stein, resided at 827 Eighth Avenue, Astoria, Long Island. He came to Camp Smith on Sunday, June 12th, with his regiment from New York City. The accident, which cost him his life, occurred on Saturday afternoon, about 2:30 o'clock, and is believed to have occurred in the swimming pool. The body was removed to the parlors of E. A. Bartle, 948 Main Street, Peekskill, from which it was yesterday removed to Astoria, Long Island.

Dr. Edwin Huntington, of Ossining, who is acting as County Medical Examiner during the absence of Dr. Amos O. Squire, came to Peekskill yesterday and viewed the remains. He signed the death certificate as "asphyxiation by drowning at Camp Smith, Peekskill, N. Y. Contributory—accidental." Stein was unmarried.

Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at his late residence, Astoria, Long Island.

Stein failed to report at the roll call last night. Several searching parties began to get busy and his body was found on the inside of the new swimming pool at Camp Smith. The body was recovered by grappling after several hours search.

General Haskell has appointed a military court of inquiry to determine how Private Bernard Stein, 192d Medical Regiment, found death in four feet of water.

CAR RUNS WILD

A car, which had been left parked on Dewey Street by a youth named Sloat, of North Division Street, got loose yesterday and caused considerable excitement in the vicinity of Dewey Street and Central Avenue. Officer Paul Gain, who was near the street at the time, saw the machine proceeding down Dewey Street, between South Street and Central Avenue, and cried out to the youngsters who were playing in the street to get out of the way. The automobile continued to gain speed as it proceeded down the street, crossed Central Avenue and went into the Tan yard, crashing against a barn.

COST HIM \$50

Harry Rosenstock, 23 years, of 176 Livingston Street, New York City, was arrested yesterday morning following a collision between his car and the Peekskill police patrol, which was driven by Officer Walter DeGolyer. The accident occurred at the corner of South Street and Division Streets. It was claimed that Rosenstock was driving on the wrong side of the street. He was fined \$50 by Judge J. Wesley Barker on a charge of reckless driving. He also agreed to pay ten dollars for repairs to the patrol.

AGAIN IN THE TOILS

John Green, colored, of 195 Water Street, was arrested Saturday on a charge of intoxication, it being his second offense. It was also learned that he had broken his parole about a week ago. He was fined ten dollars for each charge or given the alternative of going to the Westchester County penitentiary for thirty days.
