The Rev. James Otipoby, a Comanche Indian, educated by Reformed Church Missions, who returned to teach and preach among his people, spoke yesterday before joint meeting of First and Secand Reformed Church women.

The Pirst Church group was hostess at the session for which Mr. Otlpoby sketched Comanche dealings with the U. S. government in the last century. He told of the cholesale transportation of the Comarches to Oklahoma from Texas, their subsequent return for revenge, of their human offerings of captured women and children to the sun god, which terrified the white man. He was one of the first Indian children baptized at the mission in Laughton, Okla. Mr. Otipoby returned to teach at Laughton and was later transferred to New Mexico, his present post,




